

We remain fully committed to buying the pub and we know there is still a very strong desire from the community to purchase the Punch Bowl.


Whilst we are in this negotiation phase, our campaign communications are going by email to investors only. As soon as we are able to announce a timeline for purchase, we will be letting everyone know.



## Will you be feeling the cold this winter? What is the Winter Fuel Payment?

The **Winter Fuel Payment** is an annual payment to help you with heating costs during the colder months. The Government announced in July 2024 that, from this year onwards, to be eligible you must have reached State Pension age **and** receive a qualifying means-tested benefit.

You may be eligible for the **Winter Fuel Payment** in the winter of 2024-2025 if you meet all the following criteria:

- you were born on or before 22 September 1958
- you receive **Pension Credit, Universal Credit, Income Support,** income-based **Jobseeker's Allowance** or income-related **Employment and Support Allowance**, or an award of **Child Tax Credit** or **Working Tax Credit** of at least £26 during the tax year 2024-25you were living in England or Wales for the qualifying week, which is 16<sup>th</sup> to 22<sup>nd</sup> September 2024.

#### What is Pension Credit?

Pension Credit is a means-tested benefit for people over State Pension age who have a low income. It comes in 2 parts: **Guarantee Credit** and **Savings Credit**. It's separate from your State Pension. You might be eligible for one or both parts.

**Part 1: Guarantee Credit** you might be eligible if you've reached State Pension age. This is currently 66 for both men and women. If you've reached State Pension age, you can claim Guarantee Credit if your weekly income is less than:

- £218.15 if you're single
- £332.95 if you're a couple.

Even if your weekly income is higher than these thresholds, you could still claim Guarantee Credit if you meet one of the following criteria:

you're a carer
you have a severe disability
you have certain housing costs, such as service charges
you're responsible for a child or young person who usually lives with you.

**Part 2: Savings Credit**. If you reached State Pension age before 6 April 2016 – or if you're a couple and both of you did – you might be eligible to claim Savings Credit. There isn't a savings limit. However, if you have over £10,000 in savings, this will affect how much you receive.

## What if one of us is over state pension age, and the other isn't?

If you're a mixed age couple (meaning only one of you is over State Pension age), you normally have to claim **Universal Credit** you've both reached State Pension age. Then you might be eligible to claim **Pension Credit** as a couple.

**How do I claim?** You can **either:** claim online on GOV.UK\_(if you already claim State Pension and there aren't any children or young people included in your claim) **or:** call the Pension Credit claim line on **0800 99 1234** and they can fill in the application for you over the phone (lines are open Monday to Friday, 8am-6pm).

#### Before you start, have these details to hand:

- your National Insurance number
- your bank account details
- information about your income, savings and investments
- information about your pension (if you have one)
- details of any housing costs you have (such as a mortgage, interest payments or service charges)

your partner's details if you have a partner.

#### Remember:

By claiming **Pension Credit**, you might become eligible for other benefits too, such as help with health and housing costs.

You have nothing to lose by applying, and potentially a lot to gain. Even if you've previously been turned down, you can still make a new claim each year.

#### 'Sport for All' at Burton's own MUGA!

After a few delays (some weather related) Burton's multi use games area refurbishment has really taken shape. The 26 year-old surface, which was tired and balding, dented and battered, has been replaced.



The old carpet was removed, the site pressure washed and some tree root damage repaired before the new carpet was laid with its first dressing of protective sand.





The new pitch will play softer and flatter and will be an altogether more enjoyable experience for five a side, tennis, basketball practice and a host of other possible sports.



It's really important that the MUGA is now used by the community and while we wait for the booking/charging system to be installed, it has been agreed that the pitch can be booked for free until the end of January 2025 by emailing the Parish Clerk at <a href="mailto:billparishcouncil@gmail.com">billparishcouncil@gmail.com</a>. The only charge made will be for the floodlights if

required, at £2.50 per hour. And everyone is encouraged to come down and take a look at the new site on Saturday morning 23 November 9.00 - 12.30pm.

Funds raised from a Football Foundation grant (£25,000) have covered the bulk of the court costs, while a new booking and door entry system to be installed in January, is funded by a £11,700 grant from North Yorkshire Sport. Burton Community Sports volunteers have overseen the project, contributing £7,000 in funds and securing £2,300 from Burton Regeneration Group. A new grant from the Harold Bridges Trust has helped purchase a new tennis net and basketball rings.

The site will be managed from January by the Parish Council, which owns the MUGA.

## Burton in Lonsdale Bowling Club Review of 2024 Steve Vose

The club has participated in 4 different local leagues throughout the season and continues to grow both in numbers and ability.

The Kendal League team, well captained by Lee Marshall, finished 7<sup>th</sup> overall in a very competitive 3<sup>rd</sup> division. John Mason once again captained the senior side on Monday afternoons with a 4<sup>th</sup> place finish securing their place in the 4<sup>th</sup> division next season. Steve Vose led the Rural League team to 7<sup>th</sup> place in the league, a most creditable result considering that most players were new to the game of bowls. The club also rejoined the Morecambe league and, with Tony Blacow as captain, convincingly won the 5<sup>th</sup> division. Tony also managed to win the individual averages for the whole league whilst Frank Joel managed to play every match in both the Kendal and Morecambe leagues.

The recruitment of 13 new players over the last 18 months, all living within the village, was the highlight of the season and has given the club a real boost going forward. Perhaps it's your turn to join us?

8 friendly matches were arranged by Jane Burns against local villages and were played on Saturday afternoons. Club Captain, Doreen Dryden, expertly organised the running of these matches. It was the turn of Austwick to host the Home Guard Cup, a long established competition between Burton, Bentham, Ingleton & Austwick in which Bentham triumphed this year on a very wet afternoon.

The Club singles was won by Shaun Wilson whilst the pairing of Shaun & Malcolm Taylor took the doubles title.

Special thanks must again go to the Community Workforce who laid flags for the new scoring hut. The work of the many volunteers was much appreciated. Shaun Wilson and Tony Blacow looked after the green throughout the season whilst Shaun used his skills to construct the hut and fencing around certain areas of the green.

The annual Jumble sale was, once again, a real success. The generous donations from folk in the village combined with hard work from many within the club generated much needed funds to keep the club running along with the grants sourced by our President John Wood. Special thanks also go to the ladies who have supported the teams by providing refreshments and marking matches in all weathers, without their efforts match nights would certainly be more challenging.

As a former joint editor of the Burtonian, I have been asked to pen a few words about Mike, a great friend to the village, who we sadly lost on 4th November.

David and I took over the editorship of the Burtonian in April 2016, under the 'expert' guidance of Mike, a previous editor himself, and chairman of the communication committee. Little did we know at the time that along with this new role came a list of instructions and critiques as long as your arm. 'The font is wrong' 'There are too many spaces' 'The photos are too big' 'Don't leave a line between paragraphs' 'Correct the grammar' and so it went on, it was endless. What we didn't initially realise was that this was Mike's acerbic sense of humour, sharp and forthright with a tinge of superiority that we soon grew to love, once we had the measure of the man. Many of you will remember him, not as Mike, but as the anonymous 'Foreign, Fashion, Political, Education, Defence, Brexit and Climate Change correspondent' to name but a few, introducing the aforementioned humour into the pages of the Burtonian. Never was there a less anonymous correspondent. Of course, not everyone appreciated Mike's humour, but he never intended his writing to be taken too seriously, and was genuinely sorry for any offence he inadvertently caused.

Mike always had a good way with words: From 2006:

"Dear All

In an effort to ameliorate the bottom line performance of the news desk it has become imperative that the method of information and intelligence gathering be enhanced in order to maintain the effective distribution of incoming and outgoing data. To facilitate this objective the primary communication channel has been modified.

Mike loved Burton. He would do anything for the village, and was the driving force behind several village events that will remain long in our memories. In particular, he, together with Mike Biles spent months planning and delivering the 2018 village centenary celebration of the end of WW1, which was a huge achievement and brought the village together in an outpouring of nostalgia, remembrance and respect. He also headed up the committee who organised the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations, culmi-



nating in a fabulous street party on Low Street which featured Mike's favourite musical ensemble, Dani Sicari and the Easy Rollers. More topically, 10 years ago he led the original bid to purchase the Punch Bowl Inn for the community, and in recent times, whilst confined to his house by illness, almost the first question on his lips when we popped in to see him, was 'any news on the pub?'.

Mike's driving was legendary. To be a passenger in his much loved elderly Mercedes, was an experience like no other, he didn't hang about. Some years ago, when taking part in the first of several village car treasure hunts, Mike borrowed the Age Concern Minibus (which he used to drive as a volunteer) as his car wasn't big enough to accommodate himself and family members. Driving carefully on these events was the rule of the day as the route was mainly on narrow country lanes, but suffice to say Mike was the last to set off and the first to arrive back. So much for rules......

Underneath the brash and forthright exterior lay a big softie. Getting to know the real Mike took time, but once the connection was made you were rewarded with a loyal and unwavering friendship, a man who would be first in line to offer help when needed, nothing was too much trouble. In the last year, Mike was unable to leave his house, and those of us who visited and helped to look after him were humbled by his ability to remain uncomplaining and dignified in the face of such difficult circumstances.

There is a saying that there are some people who are 'the better for knowing' and Mike was such a person. I would like to think that we too, are better people for having known him. I'm sure I speak for all of Mike's friends when I say that we will miss him terribly, Burton will miss him, he will be a hard act to follow.

The recipe for the biscotti, is from the book "Giuseppe's Easy Bakes" by Giuseppe Dell'Anno who won the British Bake Off in 2021.

I attended his masterclass where we baked these delicious biscotti.

They are super easy and very quick to make, and only use basic store cupboard ingredients. You can have them baked in no time at all.

Alternative nuts to use could be pistachios or hazel nuts, which can be partially or entirely swapped.

These traditional Italian biscuits are often served with an espresso or dipped in vin santo, port works well too!

Giuseppe with a wink said I could share his recipe in the Burtonian if the readers followed him on instagram!

Ingredients: 1 medium egg; 120g caster sugar; 1tsp vanilla bean paste; zest of 1 unwaxed lemon; zest of 1 unwaxed orange; ¼ tsp salt; 140g plain flour (plus extra for dusting); ½ tsp baking powder; 100gms whole unblanched almonds.

- Set the shelf in the middle of the oven, pre-heated to 180 degrees (C). Line a baking tray with baking paper or a silicone mat;
- Put the egg, sugar, vanilla, and salt in a bowl big enough to accommodate all the ingredients and lightly whisk them just long enough to combine. Sift in the flour and baking powder and combine, first with a spoon, then by hand until the mixture comes together as a soft dough. Add the almonds and work the dough to incorporate them. Turn the dough onto a lightly floured worktop and divide into two halves; shape each half as a large "sausage", no more than 3cms thick, then place them of the lined baking sheet.
- Bake for 23- 25 minutes until the "sausages" have puffed up and the tops are slightly browned. Take them out of the oven and lower the temperature to 150 degrees. Allow the biscuits to cool for 5 minutes on the baking sheet and, when firm enough to handle, slice with a sharp serrated knife.
- Place the still-warm slices sideways back onto the baking sheet and bake for a further 10 minutes, turning them over midway to ensure an even bake.
- Leave the biscuits to cool for a few minutes on the baking sheet, then transfer them to a wire rack to cool completely. Cantucci keep for up to a month in an airtight container

After their highly enjoyable 2023-24 season under their effervescent Columbian conductor, Maca Barbosa, Settle orchestra are looking forward to another season of first-class music making. For this year they will be conducted by Harry Lai, another graduate student of the masters course at Manchester's Royal Northern College of Music. Harry is from Hong Kong and has already made his mark in the UK, collaborating with orchestras such as the Hallé, the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra and Birmingham Opera Company.

#### NOTES FROM AN UNINTENDED NATURALIST DECEMBER 2024

40 years ago I moved from London to teach on Walney Island. My Art Room overlooked the rugby pitch to The Atlantic Ocean, beyond.

I learnt to recognise the redshanks and greenshanks and other waders that came up from the pebble beach, to feed .

One weekend I walked at low tide across to Piel Island. I remember the shimmer of silver blue mussels in the ochre sands. To my left, in a grassy area with white sea campion, was the gentle warm brown plumage of a female eider sitting on her eggs. Tiny wisps of soft eider-down, that she had plucked from her breast to insulate her nest, peeped out.

Neither of us moved and I treasure that memory of stillness: I took no photos. It was the happiest I had been for a very long time.

The Nature Reserve on Walney was another frequently visited place. At the time, it was run by naturalist, Tim Dean.

This Summer, 2024, I was birdwatching on Orkney, by the cliffs of Marwick Head. The rocky ledges were dark but spattered with white, as countless thousands of Guillemots, Razorbills, occasional Puffins and many more seabirds were roosting with their young, perched precariously on the cliffs above the sea far below.

Approaching me, there was Tim Dean leading a group of birdwatchers. We had a lovely exchange of our shared Walney memories.

Later, I watched a large crèche of eider ducklings with their mothers in some shallow water. The young, at just a few hours old, follow their mothers to the sea where they feed on the vegetation. They are not yet waterproof, so only stay in the water for a short while, before drying out. Later in their development, they will have learned to dive, and prise open mussels, with their strong beaks.



The winter months in our area of the North attract huge numbers of overwintering migrants from Arctic regions. Morecambe Bay, with rich nutrients in its sands, attracts flocks of knot, curlew, dunlin, grey plovers, and oystercatchers. They form their murmurations, in the sky as they gather, waiting for the tide to turn; then, as the vast sands are revealed, they descend in glorious order to feed.

#### And from our Vicar Harriet

I wonder when Christmas begins for you? Is it the first appearance of Christmas decorations in the shops? Is it the first time you hear Band Aid's 'Do they know it's Christmas?' on the radio? Is it tasting your first mince pie? For many people Christmas begins with the BBC - not with the Strictly final, but in the voice of a young chorister singing the opening verse of 'Once in Royal David's City' from the chapel of King's College Cambridge. That is the moment to sit down, pour a cuppa (or something stronger) and feel that at last, Christmas has really arrived. Whether with family or alone, that glorious treble sound never fails to cause a shiver down the spine.

Traditional carols are the soundscape to my childhood Christmases, as they are to many people. Attending a Methodist chapel as a child meant that I soon learned to join enthusiastically in the singing of such classics as 'Hark the Herald Angels Sing' and (less enthusiastically) 'While Shepherds Watched' - I'm sure you have your own favourites! For the joy of lifting up my voice in familiar songs with others. For the connection with people everywhere celebrating the light of Christ shining in the darkness of our world. And for the hope they express that two thousand years ago something amazing happened that changed our world forever.

Whatever your reasons may be, if you would like to join in singing carols at some point this Christmas - and especially if you would like to bring children to start creating their own memories -then you are welcome to any of the Christmas events in All Saints or at any of the churches in the Ingleborough team. But whatever and wherever you sing this Christmas - or even if you just listen —
